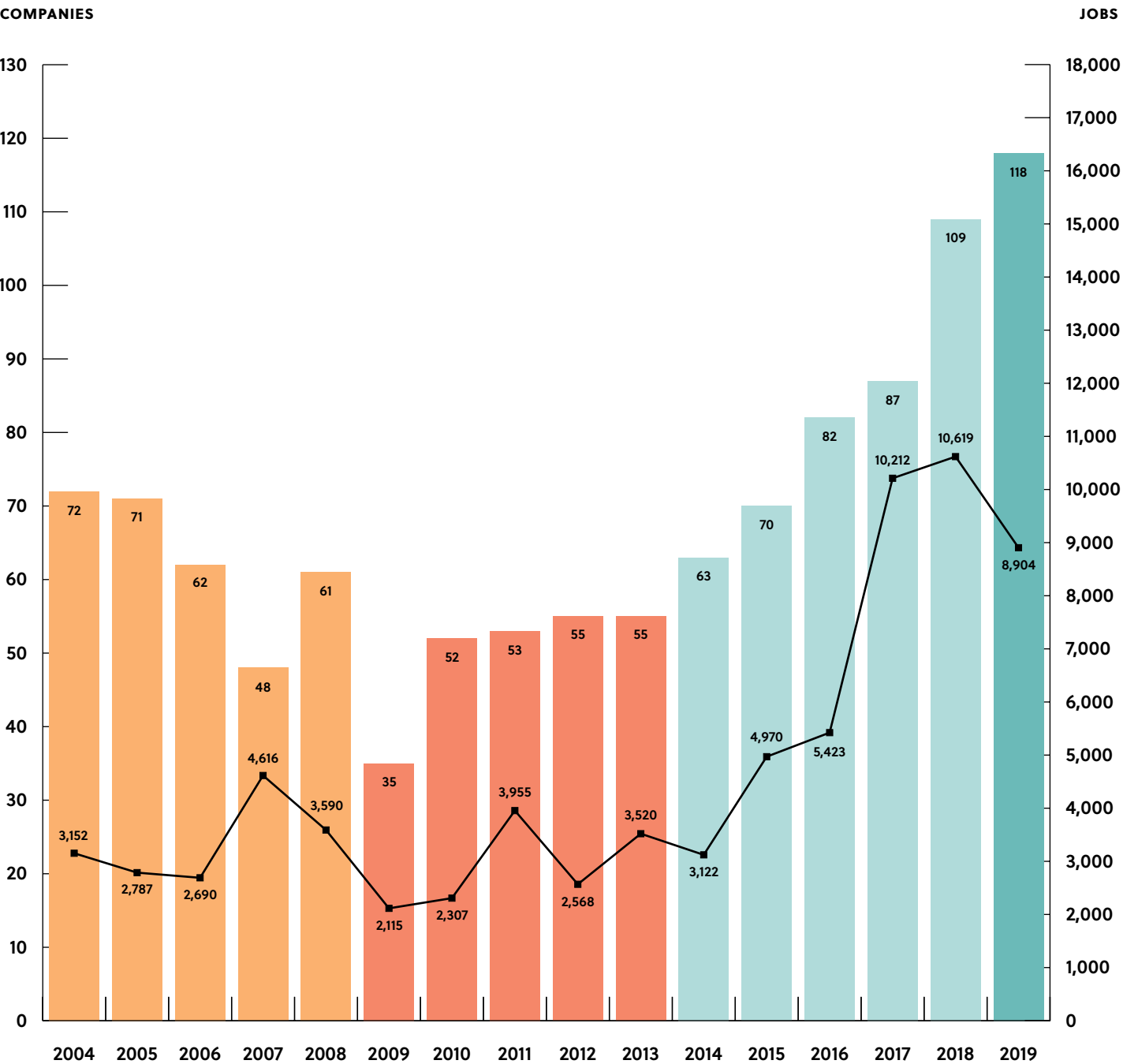

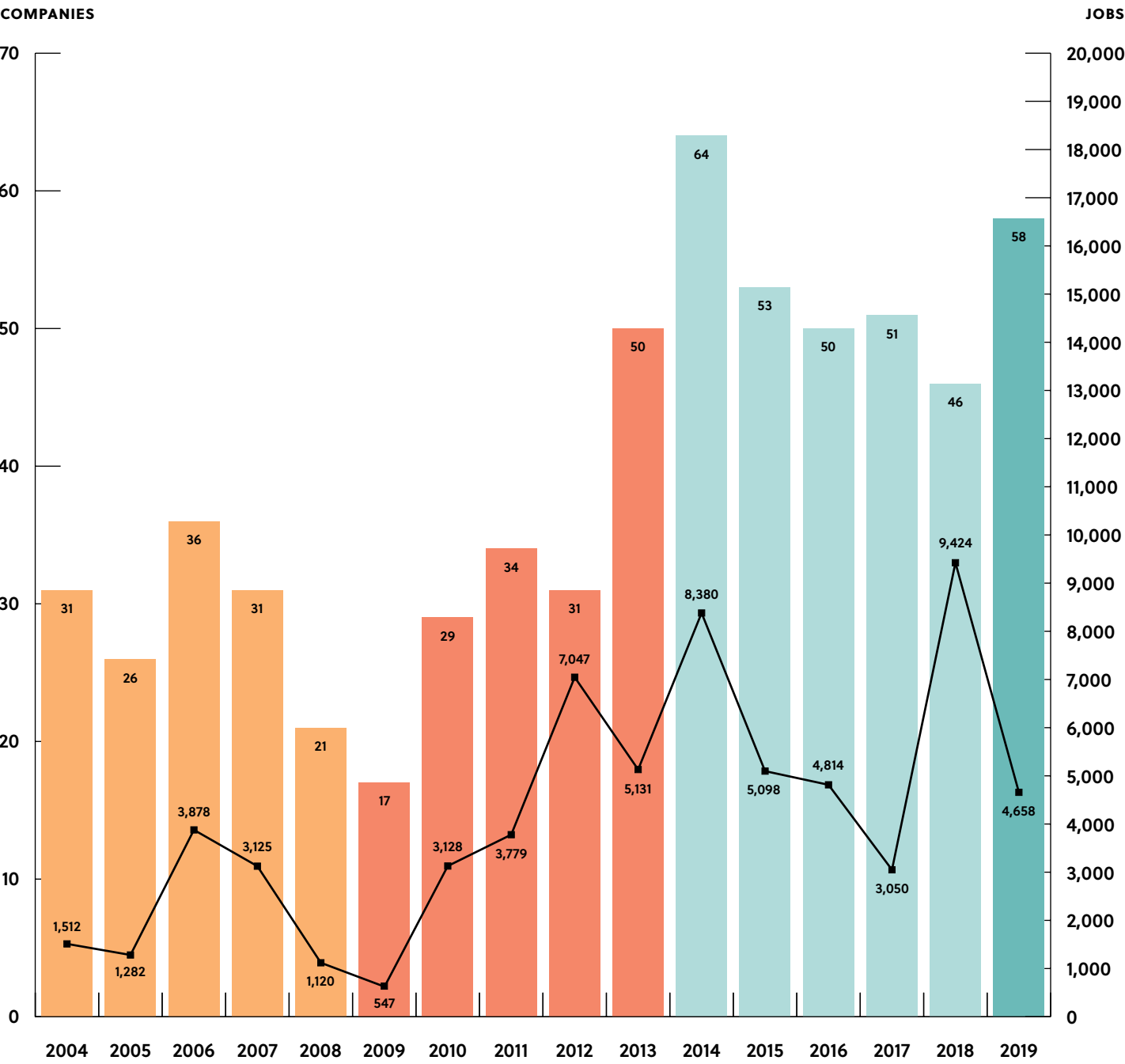

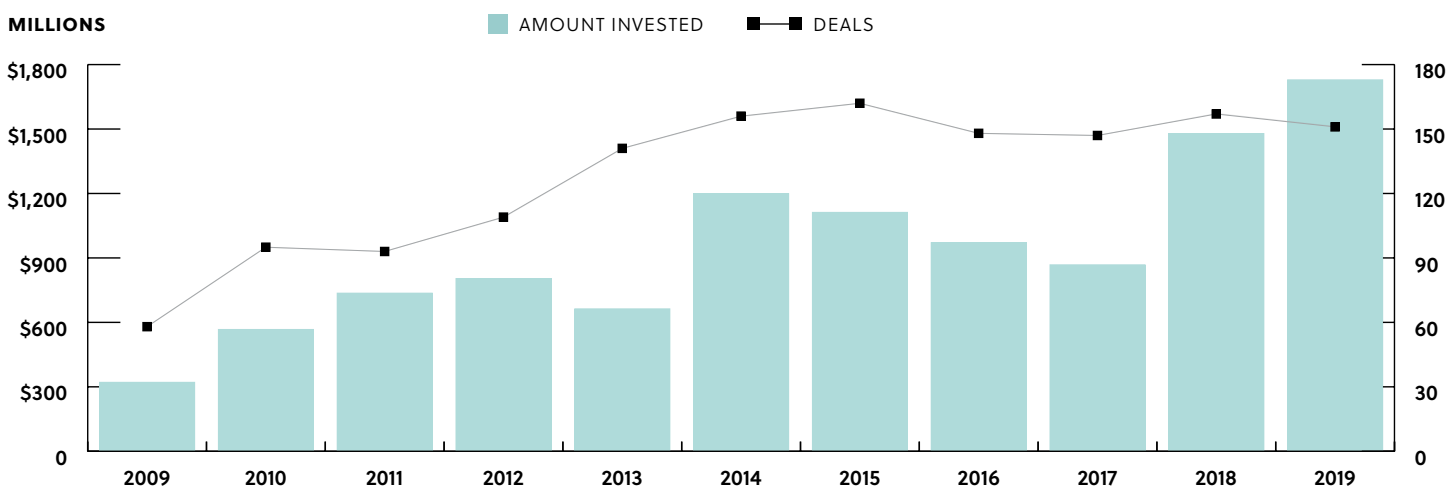

Army Futures Command

After helping bring the Army Futures Command to Austin in 2018, the Chamber has played an active role in assisting AFC in building its operations in the region.

THE CHAMBER

- › Worked with the Central Texas congressional delegation to support funding for military modernization and ensure the Basic Allowance for Housing and locality pay is in line with similarly priced markets to recruit talent to Austin-based defense innovation efforts
- › Initiated dialogue leading to roundtable discussions to learn how the community can better assist military personnel and their families to smoothly transition to the region
- › Coordinated tech CEO roundtables for Army Applications Lab leaders to expand their outreach and messaging.

Additionally, the Chamber continues to recruit defense-related companies to the region.

- › Acutronic located its new Aerospace Products Division in Austin.
- › Defense contractor Booz Allen Hamilton expanded.
- › Four defense-related companies began operations out of Capital Factory.

The Chamber and its school district partners have implemented new college and career readiness and placement initiatives to expand college and career preparation options for Central Texas students.



Direct-to-College Achievement Plan (DTC70)

Aims to ensure 70% of high school graduates are enrolled directly in postsecondary education



Direct-to-Work (DTW30)

Aims to place 30% of high school graduates in career training for employment, internships, and apprenticeships paying a middle income or above

Thanks to the Chamber's efforts, DTC70 partners can track college-readiness rates in real time to ensure students are able to directly enroll in credit-bearing courses without need of remediation following high school graduation. This work ensures students are more likely to complete their degree.

Talent Ambassador program connects employers to future talent

The Chamber launched a Talent Ambassador program to allow employers to attract, retain and upskill qualified talent. This program provides employers interested in honing local talent to engage with K-12 schools and/or two- or four-year post-secondary institutions by offering internships/apprenticeships for students to earn while they learn, company site tours to engage students in careers with labor market demand, or connect students to other upskilling opportunities aligned with their company's talent needs or corporate social responsibility priorities.

New credential completion goals outlined in joint Chamber/ACC Progress Report

In collaboration with Austin Community College (ACC), the Chamber published its sixth ACC Progress Report, analyzing the most urgent workforce needs in Central Texas and ACC's progress toward improving access, persistence, and completion rates in these fields.

Legislation aligned to advance college/career placement strategies

At the state level, the Chamber and its partners successfully backed passage of HB3 legislation to lessen the impact of state recapture of Central Texas local tax dollars in area schools and to create financial incentives for schools whose graduates are college, career and military ready. At the federal level, the Chamber coordinated with Congressman Lloyd Doggett to further simplify the FAFSA, increase PELL college scholarships, and commit additional funding to minority-serving higher education institutions via the FUTURE Act.

Boards of the Chamber and partner organization Real Estate Council of Austin passed a joint resolution to support Capital Metro's Project Connect vision, provided key items are addressed.

Local



Opposed unnecessarily high burdens for community activities on city-owned property

The Chamber board of directors voted to oppose City of Austin Proposition A, which would create an unnecessarily high burden for community activities that pay to use city-owned facilities. This ordinance would have discouraged new community events and recreational sports hosted at city-owned facilities.



Opposed the prevention of needed investment in Austin Convention Center that would damage our tourism industry

The Chamber board of directors voted to oppose City of Austin Proposition B, which would limit the city's ability to expand the Austin Convention Center. We support Austin's standing as a premier destination for tourism and the expansion of the Austin Convention Center to help attract more convention and conference business for the city.

86th Texas Legislature

The Chamber supported and advocated for key policy initiatives to ensure Texas remains competitive when it comes to infrastructure and strong economic fundamentals necessary for attracting and retaining job creators and talent.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT TOOLS

The Legislature approved increased funding for economic development projects and renewed the ability for local governments to offer tax abatements on new investment projects.



HB 1

Appropriates \$534 million for economic development projects



HB 3143

Extends Tax Code Chapter 312 to 2029

EDUCATION IMPROVEMENT

The Legislature approved landmark legislation that reforms public education funding. The legislation will keep money for Central Texas schools in Central Texas, while reducing property tax rates. We estimate school district property taxes due to state recapture (aka Robin Hood) would have gone up by approximately \$600 million in FY21 without the passage of HB 3.



FAFSA

The state expects all high school graduates, starting with today's sophomores, to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).



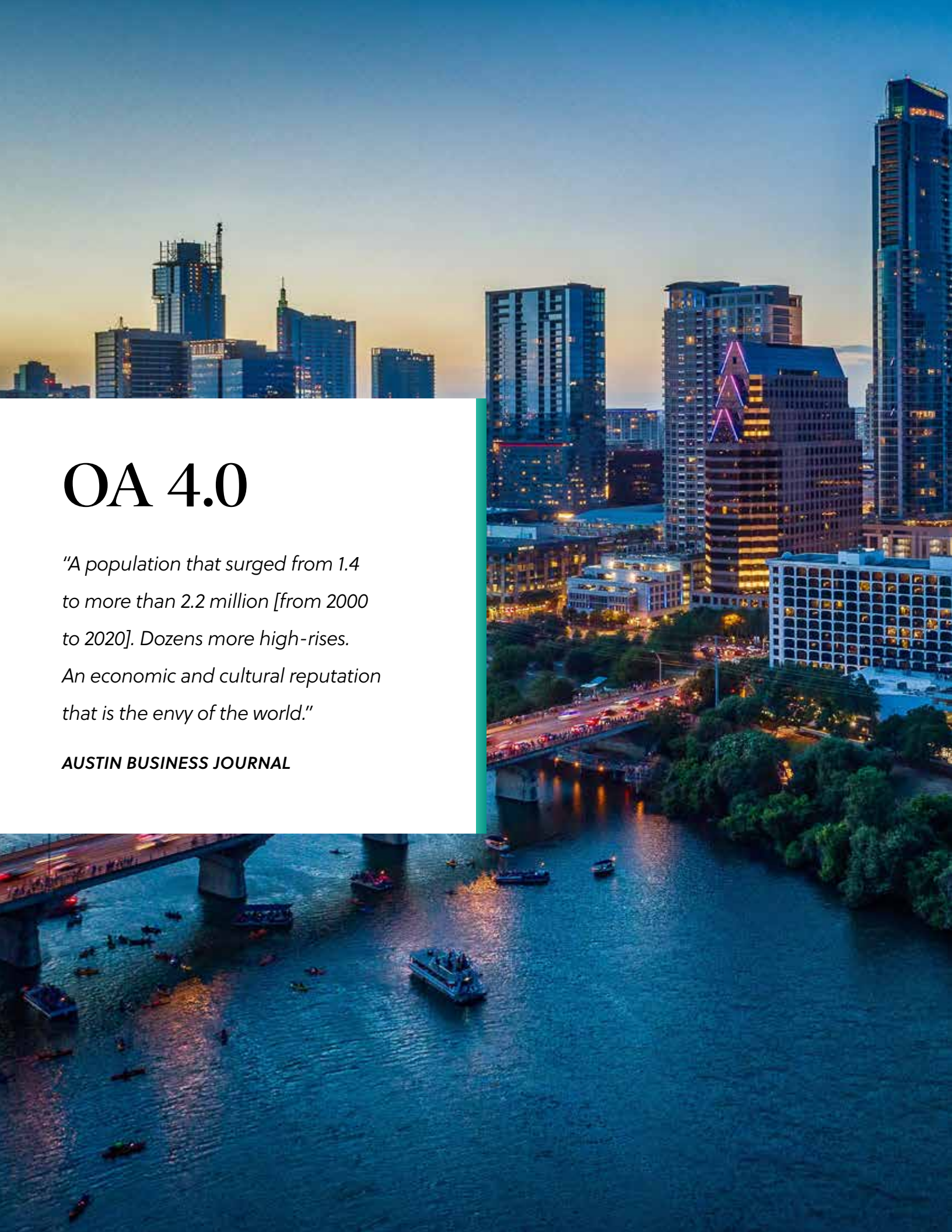
COLLEGE/CAREER/ MILITARY READINESS

School districts will receive \$3,000-\$5,000 in bonuses for each student who graduates college ready and either goes directly to college, enlists in the US Armed Forces, or earns a certification that leads to middle-wage employment.

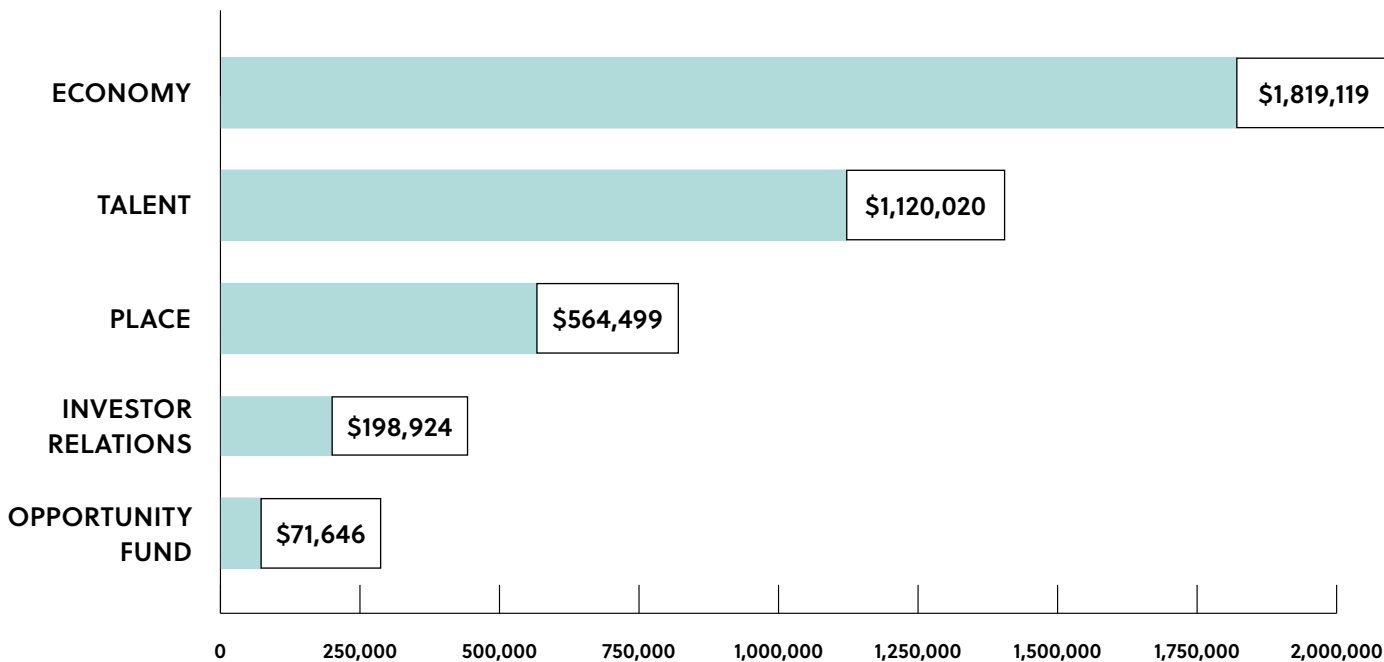

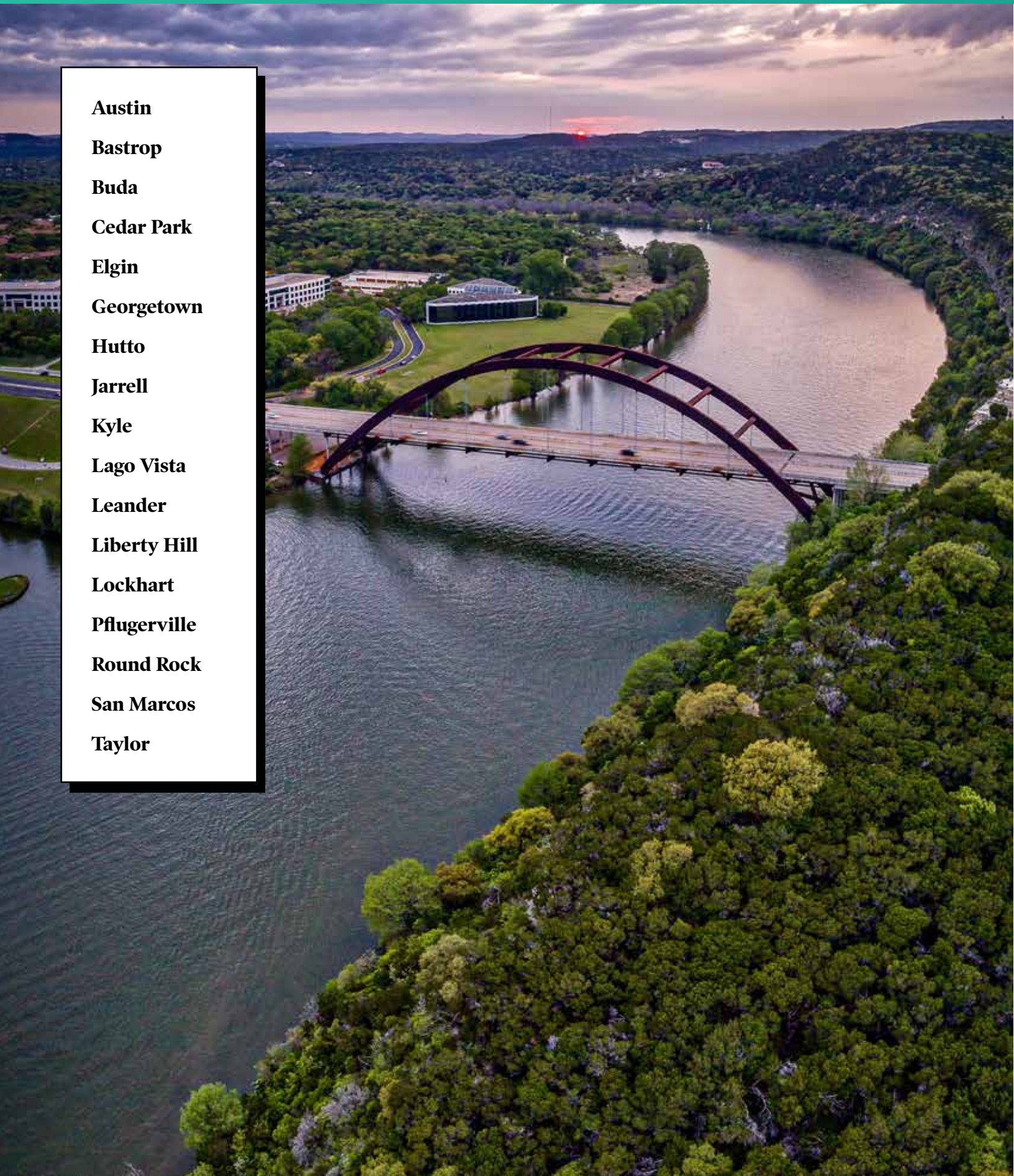

HIGHLIGHTS

Austin

- › Zoho, an international software company, announced plans to relocate its headquarters from California and open a 100,000 square foot office on a 375-acre campus in southeast Austin, creating 440 jobs.
- › Amazon announced plans to lease 245,000 square feet in the Domain, adding 1,400 new jobs. It continues to build its presence in the Austin region through all office locations, distribution facilities and its Whole Foods subsidiary.
- › H-E-B signed a long-term lease for 81,000 square feet to house its world-class tech center and innovation lab for its digital team and Favor, the on-demand delivery service.
- › PREP, the largest provider of multi-user culinary production space in the Southeast, announced its expansion to Austin. PREP ATX's 55,000 square foot incubator will provide support to numerous food and beverage companies and their 200+ associated jobs.

Bastrop

- › Seton Healthcare Family opened a new \$30 million, 40,000 square foot medical campus.
- › The Art Institute of Austin announced plans to open 45,000 square feet of offices, classrooms and studios over three campuses in Bastrop in 2020.
- › The City of Bastrop adopted Building a Better Bastrop (B3) development codes and ordinances for more efficient and intelligent planning and streamlined permitting.

Buda

- › Buda Oaks assisted living facility is scheduled to open in Spring 2020 with 86 units.
- › Fat Quarter Shop received incentives for a 30,000 square foot expansion.
- › RDO Equipment will construct 25,000 square feet for their sales & service facility.
- › Buda Business Center has 105,000 square feet of warehouse space being constructed.

Cedar Park

- › James Avery purchased 11 acres to build their 2nd headquarters, creating 100+ jobs.
- › The United States Tennis Association (USTA) announced plans to relocate USTA-Texas headquarters to the Indigo Ridge Development.
- › Additive Manufacturing Technologies announced their North American headquarters, creating 100 jobs.
- › MSB Consulting Group will lease 45,000 square feet of space and create 250+ jobs.

Elgin

- › Seton constructed a new 5,000 square foot medical clinic, creating 8 new jobs and \$2.2 million in investment, with plans to expand.
- › Circle Brewing Company purchased 24 acres and will construct a 12,000 square foot facility with 12 employees and \$2.2 million in investment.
- › Over 8,000 homes are expected to be constructed in the next five years with some currently under construction.

Georgetown

- › Sedro Crossing broke ground on 180,000 square feet of office space.
- › WBW Development announced its relocation to downtown Georgetown with a new mixed-use building.
- › Texas Speed plans to construct over 200,000 square feet of industrial space, of which they will occupy 80,000 square feet, leaving the remainder available for lease.

Regional Partners

Hutto

- › The Innovation Business Park welcomed Brycomm and Western Industries headquarters, bringing over 200 new jobs.
- › Flix Brewhouse, Southside Market and Top Notch are under construction in the Hutto Co-Op Entertainment District.
- › Perfect Game announced their national headquarters relocation, including an \$800 million sports and events development expected to draw over 600,000 visitors annually.

Jarrell

- › Sales tax revenues grew 22% from 2017 to 2018.
- › Six new subdivisions were announced in 2019, which combined with existing developments could produce 7,000 homes over the next three years.
- › Two of the three overpasses on IH-35 were completed, with the third to be completed in 2021.
- › The City continues significant expansion of water and wastewater capacity.

Kyle

- › South Korea-based ENF Technology broke ground on a \$45 million headquarters and advanced manufacturing facility.
- › Smile Direct Club plans to occupy 150,000 square feet of building 1 at Hays Logistics Center.
- › Los Angeles based Majestic Realty Company is developing over 500,000 square feet of speculative industrial space.

Lago Vista

- › Starbucks opened its first location in Lago Vista.
- › Anytime Fitness signed the first lease in Lago Vista Village Retail Center and the city is pursuing other tenants.
- › Phase 1 construction began on Lago Vista's \$4 million community sports park.

Leander

- › Groundbreaking for the public infrastructure for Northline will occur early-mid 2020. This mixed-use project consists of 115-acres in the heart of Leander's new transit-oriented development center and will include retail, office, residential, hotel and civic uses.
- › St. David's HealthCare plans to deliver 60,000 square feet of medical office in Q1-2020.

Liberty Hill

- › The Water Tower retail center completed 21,000 square feet.
- › The Hwy 29 Office Park had 10,000 square feet of office space completed.
- › Panther Plaza has 10,000 square feet of retail space under construction.
- › Jardin Center has 10,000 square feet of retail space under construction.
- › Now Open: Hell or High Water Brewery, QuikTrip, Mojo Coffee and Little Caesars.

Lockhart

- › Promogo, a tech startup company, announced Lockhart as its new headquarters.
- › The Turner Company officially opened on 31-acres with an investment of over \$3 million. The company expects to hire 100 within the first 5 years.
- › Austin Community College and Lockhart ISD will work jointly to provide training for HVAC and welding to high school students and the public.

Pflugerville

- › Republic National Distributing Company, Austin Foam Plastics and Rosendin Electric expansions plan to provide 398 full-time jobs.
- › Pflugerville Community Development Corporation (PCDC) received accreditation as an Economic Development Organization from the International Economic Development Council.
- › PCDC and the City approved a new economic strategic plan (CEDS 2.0) focusing on workforce and targeted industries.

Round Rock

- › Goodkind Co. expanded into a 45,000 square foot facility with 100 new jobs.
- › BGE opened a 25,000 square foot office at Frontera Crossing with 80 new jobs.
- › Sovos Brands invested \$11.9 million into upgrading and retrofitting its facility.
- › EastGroup Properties broke ground at Settler's Crossing offering over 330,000 square feet of light industrial space.

San Marcos

- › Coast Flight announced that they are now 1 of 4 American Airlines training programs in the country, retaining 20 jobs and adding 10 more.
- › Katerra is breaking ground on new manufacturing facility to add 542 jobs and \$109 million capital investment.
- › CFAN, producer of Boeing jet engine fan blades, increased production and added over 100 jobs.

Taylor

- › Hart Components, a lumber company, will invest \$4.5 million in capital investment and occupy a 60,000 square foot building, projected to create 80 new jobs.
- › RCR Taylor Rail Park, a 750-acre Master Planned rail-served logistic and industrial park with dual rail service by Union Pacific & BNSF will be completed 18-24 months.
